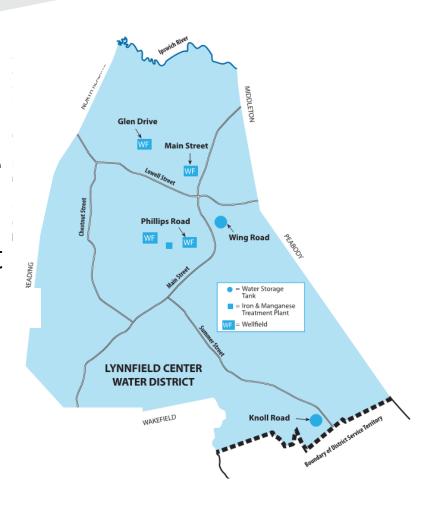

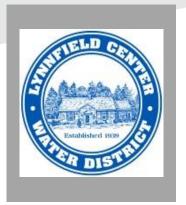
Overview of District's Water System

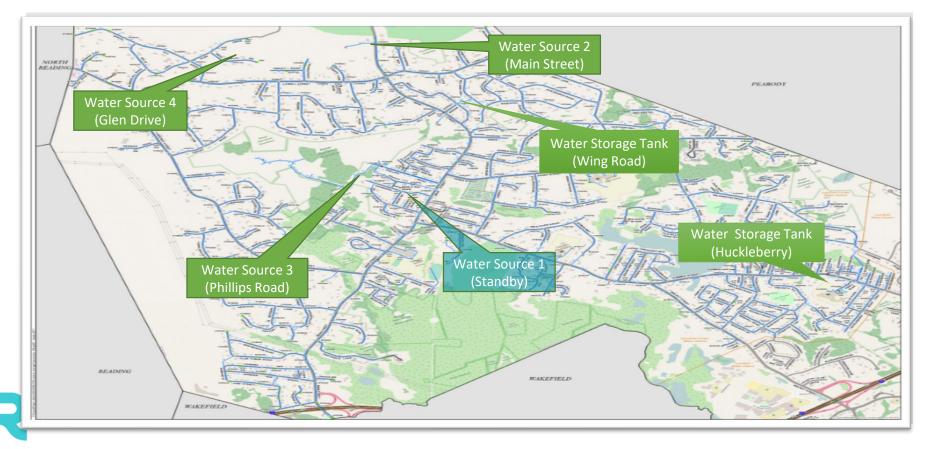
- <u>Sources</u>: four groundwater well sites (three active, one standby)

- <u>Distribution</u>: 48 miles of water main

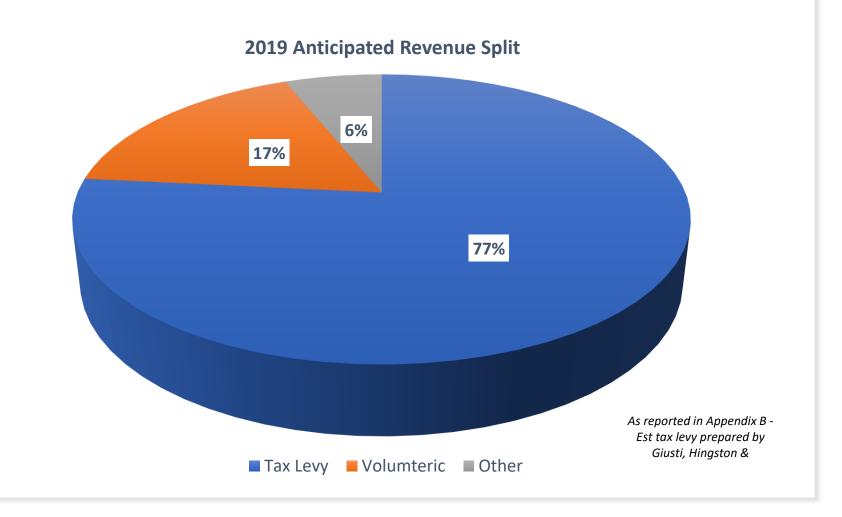








How Does LCWD Collect Revenue?



Rate Study General Overview

- Purpose: Determine an appropriate methodology for the District's cost recovering mechanisms, while balancing policy objectives and customer impacts
- Scope: Analyze water usage from previous years and assessed property values to calculate new water rates that fully recover required revenues, at an appropriate balance between tax and rate recovery
- Key Goals:
 - > Promote equity amongst customer base
 - Maintain adequate revenue stability
 - Reduce revenue reliance on tax base
 - Ensure adequate revenues in order for District to fully fund all necessary investments in water system



Study Assumptions

- Move to quarterly billing
- Reduce number of tiers to simplify rate structure (3 tiers)
- Recognize increased cost of servicing non-residential customers through quarterly fixed charge
- Increase revenues to ensure financial sufficiency
- Reduce reliance on taxes by recovering only 30% of revenues from tax base (currently ~70%)

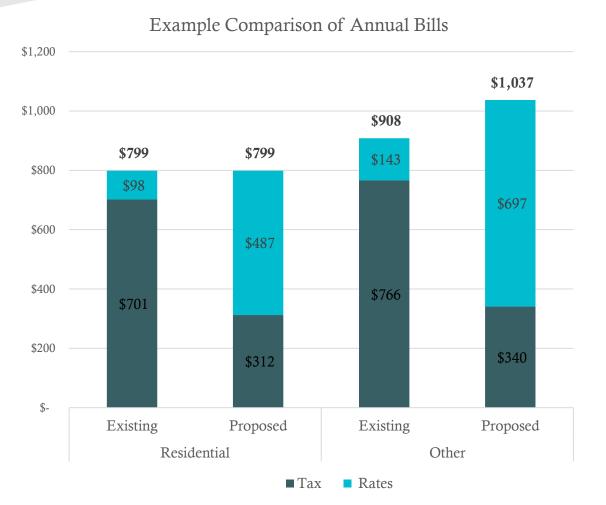

Typical Impacts from New Rates (2021)

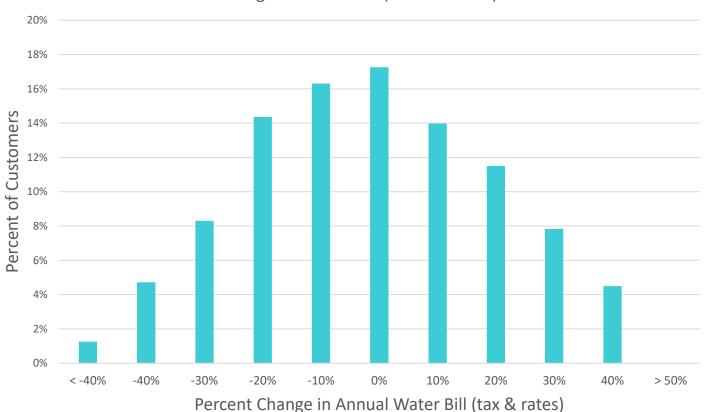
 Customers with high assessed value and low water consumption will benefit from this structural change
